

Apprenticeships & Technical Education in West Yorkshire





Build your knowledge

In this guide, you will find lots of useful information to help you understand the technical education options available to your child when they finish school or college, as well as useful links to websites where you can go to find out more and explore helpful hints and tips.

Below, we share 5 top tips for parents and carers who are supporting their child to explore apprenticeships and technical education options.

5 tips for parents and carers



Be open-minded. Technical education has changed a great deal and there are a range of opportunities that your child may now like to explore. Try to put aside any preconceptions and be open to finding out about all the options.



Use available support. There are lots of tools at your disposal to research what is out there for your child - their school/college, company websites, careers websites, social media, podcasts, webinars...there is so much to support you!



Don't expect your child to know what they want to do. We know that many young people don't know yet what they want to do or may not have discovered the range of careers available.



Think about how your child learns. You know your child and what makes them tick. Consider how they might learn best and whether a technical or academic course might be best for them.



Hear from other young people. Try to arrange to visit or attend open days at schools and colleges that run courses your child is interested in and talk to current students to get up-to-date information and opinions.

Understanding apprenticeships



What are apprenticeships?

An apprenticeship is a real job with a real employer where your child will work, earn a salary and gain valuable and practical experience whilst studying.

As an apprentice, your child will:

- be employed.
- work alongside experienced colleagues.
- spend roughly 6 hours per week undertaking off-the-job learning.
- complete assessments during and at the end of their apprenticeship.

What apprenticeships are available?

There are over 600 different apprenticeships across a range of levels and sectors, from engineering to digital, IT health, creative, design, science, education, sport & fitness, business, hospitality and many more!

What are the different apprenticeship levels?

Apprenticeships are available from Level 2 (which is equivalent to GCSEs) right up to Level 7 (which is equivalent to a Master's degree), so your child can even achieve a degree through an apprenticeship! Which level your child should do will depend on the role and sector.

Who can do an apprenticeship?

Anyone over the age of 16 who is living in England and not already in education. There is no upper age limit for an apprenticeship and they are a great way to upskill during your career or to help you change career.

How long do apprenticeships take?

Apprenticeships are a minimum of 1 year, with most taking typically between 1-6 years to complete, depending on the level.

Do apprentices pay for their training?

No, apprentices do not pay towards their training, all costs are covered by the employer and/or the Government.

How does the learning element work?

Off-the-job learning is facilitated by a training provider, which could be a college, independent training provider or university. They ensure that an apprentice does all the necessary learning to complete their apprenticeship, which could be done in person or online. There are lots of different ways the learning is provided; sometimes one day a week, sometimes as less frequent longer blocks.

Why is an apprenticeship a good choice?

If your child is keen to start working and earning their own money, but also wants to gain qualifications and experience at the same time, an apprenticeship is a great choice. An apprentice learns from their colleagues in a real workplace whilst earning a salary, and being paid to learn!

T Levels overview

Understanding T Levels



What are T Levels?

T Levels are a two-year qualification that your child can do as an alternative to A-levels or other post-16 courses once they have finished their GCSEs.

As a T Level student, your child will:

- study one subject.
- spend 80% of their time in a learning environment (e.g. a classroom) and 20% in an industry placement with an employer.

What T Levels are available?

T Levels are available in more than 20 subjects, ranging from construction, legal services, healthcare science, engineering and more. You can find out more about the different subjects here:

Who can do a T Level?

T Levels are for 16-19 year olds who have completed their GCSEs. Schools and colleges set their own entry requirements and students who haven't achieved grade 4 maths and English at GCSE will work towards them alongside their T Level.

What if my child isn't ready to do a T Level yet?

If your child isn't ready to do a T Level yet, the one year T Level Transition Programme can help support them to prepare.

What are the benefits of completing a T Level?

T Levels were designed with leading businesses, so they give students all the workplace skills they need to succeed, plus the industry placement gives them real experience and knowledge of the industry they want to work in.

HTQs and IoTs overview

Understanding HTQs and Institutes of Technology



What are HTQs?

Higher Technical Qualifications (HTQs) are level 4 and 5 qualifications (equivalent to the first/second year of a university degree) that are an alternative to apprenticeships and degrees. They are aimed at students over 18 who want to study a subject to prepare them for skilled jobs.

As a HTQ student, your child will:

- study at a college, university, independent training provider or Institute of Technology for 1-2 years.
- study full or part-time with practical workshops and elements built into the course to help them to develop practical skills for the workplace.

How do HTQs link to technical education?

HTQs have been designed with employers to ensure students develop the knowledge and skills that employers want, through the courses and practical workshops.

How much do HTQs cost?

Tuition fees vary depending on the course, but HTQs are likely to cost from around £7,000 - £9,250 a year for a 1 or 2 year course. Your child may be eligible for support through student finance or a scholarship, grant or bursary.

What course subjects are available?

HTQs are a new qualification so at the moment only digital HTQs are being taught in a variety of subjects leading to roles such as network engineer, software developer and data analyst. New HTQs in construction and health and science will be available from September 2023.

What are Institutes of Technology?

Institutes of Technology (IoTs) are collaborations between further education providers (such as colleges), universities and employers. They specialise in delivering higher technical education courses (mainly at levels 4 & 5) in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) sectors.

They offer a wide range of technical courses across sectors such as digital, manufacturing, engineering and construction.



Some employers will use their own website to advertise their vacancies and will often have a dedicated page set up for their apprenticeship programmes. Your child may be required to set up an account through their website to manage their application, but others may provide instructions on how to submit the application. It's important your child does their research.

Understanding the application process

Applying for an apprenticeships position may feel more familiar to parents and carers, because most people have experienced first-hand applying for a job, or at least understand the process if they've never gone through it themselves. Because apprenticeships are real jobs, the application process is similar to applying for any other job.

Important things to note are:

- The timing of application processes will vary between different employers. Some could start recruiting as early as a year before they want the apprentice to start, others will have a shorter recruitment window, so it's important your child does their research, sets up alerts, and keeps on top of deadlines.
- Applying for an apprenticeship will normally be just like applying for any other job, with different application and interview processes used by different employers.
- There may be steps in the process that are unfamiliar to you, such as assessment centres and online testing, so it is important to understand what these involve.


