### Allocated lesson time

Year 7: one lesson per fortnight

Year 8: one lesson per week

Year 9: one lesson per fortnight

Years 10 & 11: 5 lessons per fortnight

### Instrumental Opportunities and Singing

In Year 7, students will learn to play the ukulele, piano and djembe, and will have singing opportunities throughout. In Year 8, students will continue singing, playing ukulele and piano, as well as learning samba percussion and having the opportunity to play guitar and bass guitar. In Year 9, students will be able to focus on an instrument of their choice while continuing to sing. Students will learn and perform on these instruments in a variety of solo, pair, small group and whole-class situations.

While instrumental ability is not essential in Key Stage 4, students are encouraged to use instruments of their choice in the creation of their coursework.

## Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Co-curricular music opportunities:

**Monday** – Key Stage 4 Music Achieve: Year 10 & 11 have the opportunity to develop coursework, revise, catch up on missed work or practise their instrument.

**Wednesday** – Guitar Club: students of all abilities practise playing guitar together. Students suggest the songs they want to learn and can borrow guitars if necessary.

**Thursday** – Vocal Group: an all-abilities singing club. Students select which songs they sing. Music Production Club: students are permitted to use the practice rooms to play in bands, use the computers to produce music and use the music equipment in any way they wish.

## Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

### Give-It-A-Go Sessions

Peripatetic teachers are invited into school to provide free taster sessions for students showing an interest in an instrument. There is no expectation to proceed with lessons.

### The School Musical

Each year, the Performing Arts department produces a school musical featuring singing, acting and dancing. Auditions are typically held early in the autumn term, with the production going live for a week in the spring term. Friends and family are invited to attend.

### Performing Arts Showcase

The performing arts showcase is an annual opportunity for ambitious musicians at Whitcliffe to perform in front of a large audience including their parents. This promotes confidence and ambition while providing a great experience for our students.

## **In the future**

### Concerts, workshops & trips

In the future, we aim to provide more opportunities for our students to experience professional performances. Whether this be external providers visiting us in school, workshop-based activities or trips to concerts, we hope to enrich and inspire our young musicians by offering exciting musical experiences.
